(2 pts each) For each of the operations/functions given below, indicate the tightest bound possible (in other words, giving $O(2^N)$ as the answer to every question is not likely to result in many points). Unless otherwise specified, all logs are base 2. **Your answer should be as "tight" and "simple" as possible.** For questions that ask about running time of operations, assume that the most efficient implementation is used.

You do not need to explain your answer.

4. (6 pts) Recurrence Relationships -

Suppose that the running time of an algorithm satisfies the recurrence relationship

$$T(1) = 6$$
.

and

$$T(N) = T(N-1) + N$$
 for integers $N > 1$

Find the closed form for T(N) <u>and show your work step by step</u>. In other words express T(N) as a function of N. Your answer should *not* be in Big-Oh notation – show the relevant <u>exact</u> constants in your answer (e.g. don't use "C" in your answer).

$$T(N) = T(N-1) + N$$

$$= T(N-2) + N-1 + N$$

$$= T(N-3) + N-2 + N-1 + N$$

$$= T(N-4) + N-3 + N-2 + N-1 + N$$

$$= T(N-K) + K \cdot N - \sum_{i=0}^{K-1} i$$

$$= T(N-K) + K \cdot N - \frac{(K-1)(K)}{2}$$

$$= T(1) + (N-1) \cdot N - \frac{(N-2)(N-1)}{2}$$








6. (6 pts) Trees




8. (15 pts) Hash Tables


Kens hashing to some initial location will resolve themselves using different offsets in double hashing. In quadratic probing the some pattern will be used for all values hashing to some initial location.

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
9. (15 pts) Min Heaps -
