


Partitioned Hash join example:

Relation R: 10 pages  
 Relation S: 8 pages  
 Memory: 5 pages  
 Each page can hold 2 tuples




Bucket 0	0	4	8	12

Hash R into M-1 = 4 buckets





# Partitioned hash join example continued: second pass



Read one partition of R, hash it using  $R2 \neq R$



What is the total cost?

Normally a hash table requires a bit more space than raw data but we ignore this.


Scan matching partition of S search for matches



Function R2: 0 0 8 8 12 12


# External Merge-Sort Example

Let's sort  $R$ .  
 Step 1: Read  $M=5$  pages of  $R$




We have space for  $M=5$  pages



Step 2: Sort in memory



Step 3: Sort next batch same as above.





Merge runs together




