
Professional Responsibility

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An ABET requirement

- It begins in the classroom, and much of it is common sense – such as the red italicized sentence in CSE's "Academic Misconduct Policy"

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
- As your instructor, I have professional responsibilities too

 - because if you don't, then the next time, it might be you!


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A mix of non-technical and technical

- Every professional code of conduct with which I'm familiar includes a mix of non-technical and technical elements
- E.g., the ACM Code of Ethics and Professional Conduct
 - 1.4 Be fair and take action not to discriminate
 - 2.5 Give comprehensive and thorough evaluations of computer systems and their impacts, including analysis of possible risks

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Discrimination
